

I was so happy to see everyone at our August meeting. We had two new members join and we had a wonderful lunch. Thanks everyone!





## ANISOTROPIC vs ISOTROPIC GEMS

Last April, I had the opportunity to share Rocks & Minerals with Pastor Doug's (of Mountain Christian Fellowship - that did the SPECIALITY COFFEEs at last year's Gem Show) Homeschool Group and I thought it would be fun to tie the Rocks and Minerals into their Sunday School studies...
YOU'LL NEVER GUESS WHAT I DISCOVERED!!!

The FOUNDATION STONES of NEW JERUSALEM will reflect the light so as to create RAINBOWS!

HUH?? When I looked at the list of minerals used in the foundation walls, (list on right →) in my lowly experience, I didn't think any of them created rainbows! Maybe if they had used diamonds for the walls, maybe??


Uh, maybe not!...


Science uses <u>CROSS-POLARIZED LIGHT</u> to identify which gems are isotropic and which are anisotropic.



When viewed in Cross-Polarized Light Diamonds are BLACK! (They're *ISOTROPIC*.)

BUT, all of the FOUNDATION GEM STONES are <u>ANISOTROPIC</u> and cross-polarized light causes them to shine like RAINBOWS –full of color – even the opaque ones (but you've got to cut the slice really thin!)





The light of New Jerusalem was like a precious jasper stone, "clear as crystal." - Rev 21:11
"...and there was a rainbow
round about the throne.. -Rev 4:3

Here's the 12 Foundation Stones\* of the New Jerusalem. Each of the four walls is about 1,400 miles long, 200 feet thick, and 200 feet tall!

1. <u>Jasper</u> : a var. of Chalcedony, a cryptocrystalline quartz - SiO <sub>2</sub> + add'l elements.
2. <u>Sapphire</u> = Corundum - Al <sub>2</sub> O <sub>3</sub> blue, orange-pink, golden, white, and black. (red = Ruby)
3. <u>Chalcedony</u> : cryptocrystalline quartz - SiO <sub>2</sub> + add'l elements – in blue, yellow, brown or gray.
4. Emerald: grass-green variety of Beryl - Be <sub>3</sub> Al <sub>2</sub> SiO <sub>6</sub>
5. <u>Sardonyx</u> = Onyx + alternate layers of orange-red (aka Sard) and white Chalcedony- SiO <sub>2</sub> .
6. <u>Sardius</u> = Carnelian - SiO <sub>2</sub> an orange-red var. of Chalcedony – a cryptocrystalline - SiO <sub>2</sub>
7. <u>Chrysolyte</u> = Peridot - (Mg,Fe)₂SiO₄ - transparent green gem of mineral Olivine.
8. <u>Beryl</u> - Be <sub>3</sub> Al <sub>2</sub> SiO <sub>6</sub> - colorless, Aquamarine blue to blue-green. (Emerald = green, plus comes in yellow, green-gold, red, & pink.)
9. Topaz: Al <sub>2</sub> SiO <sub>4</sub> (F,OH) <sub>2</sub> - yellow, blue, pink, gold, peach, green, red, brown, and colorless,
10. <u>Chrysoprase:</u> greenish-gold SiO <sub>2</sub> + Nickel (green)
11. <u>Jacinth</u> = orange variety of Zircon - ZrSiO <sub>4</sub> - Colorless, it's used to imitate diamonds.
12. <u>Amethyst</u> : purple transparent quartz - SiO <sub>2</sub> + Fe.

\*Scholars don't agree on what minerals some of the ancient names translate into today. This is just one list.

A Rock Hound of the Year ballot box will be located at the front of the club house with ballots available to members.


Anna will present the Rock Hound of the Year at the December meeting. Members are encouraged to vote for their selection.

## The Gemstone SAPPHIRE

Sapphire is the non-red variety of the mineral corundum (red corundum is called Ruby). At 9.0 on the Mohs scale of hardness, sapphire is the 2<sup>nd</sup> hardest natural mineral.



Blue is by far the most popular color for sapphires, but they can be almost any color, including yellow, green, white, colorless, pink, orange, brown, and purple.

<u>Padparadscha</u> is the name for a rare orange-pink variety of sapphire and it has a higher value than blue sapphires!

Sapphires with inclusions of tiny, rutile (titanium) needles exhibit an optical property called asterism. This is the star shaped effect seen in star sapphires and is usually only seen in cabochon cuts.

<u>Star sapphires</u> usually have six ray stars, but twelve ray stars are also known. When sapphires are cut 'en cabochon', they can sometimes exhibit a cat's eye effect – with a thin band of light down the center of the stone that is known as chatoyancy.

Sapphire was first created synthetically in 1902 and lab-grown sapphires are hard to separate from natural sapphires except by gemologists. They range in price and smaller stones are frequently used in less expensive jewelry.
