Now, that's a sentence you don't hear too often! Everyone knows about Aquamarine as March's Birthstone but we rarely hear about BLOODSTONE, March's secondary birthstone.

The "classic" bloodstone is opaque jasper (SiO2)...Deep green color is from tiny inclusions of chlorite, amphibole, and pyroxene - red speckles are from inclusions of iron oxide (hematite) that resemble spots of blood, hence its name.

Along with Lapis Lazuli, Turquoise, and Carnelian, Bloodstone was among the first gemstones used by mankind. Babylonian seals from 3000 BC, Roman rings and pendants and even cups, bowls and vases made in the 15th and 16th century by the Miseroni family of lapidary artists often featured Bloodstone and are exhibited in the Louvre, Prado and British museums.

Mohs hardness: 6.5 Scratch test leaves a blood red streak. It makes exquisite cabochons. Try some!

SHOP Report: Bob Young

- The Shop Steward Training Classes recently held have produced THREE successfully trained, newly minted, Shop Stewards.
- The Shop Equipment has issues. Bob and others are repairing the equipment, especially the saws.
- Saw inventory and needs: After discussion about the need for saw blades, Anna volunteered to purchase and donate several saw blades. A very generous contribution!



• The club needs to purchase saw oil. The price of the oil has increased from \$700.00/55 gallon barrel to \$1030/55 gallon barrel.

- ...Thankfully, Bob has devised a way to filter out the sludge that gathers in the oil in order to reuse our old oil.
- A motion was made by Lynn Becker to purchase one barrel of oil and purchase 15 gallons of oil from Bob Young at \$19.00/gallon. Pat Gulyas seconded the motion; passed by the majority.



• A request was made by Bob, asking club members to donate paper bags and one gallon milk cartons. These items are used in the recycling/de-sludging process of the saw oil, to be safely reused...or, we could start our own tar pit... (JUST JOKING, FOLKS)



 After assessing the current saw inventory, it was decided to postpone the purchase of a 10" saw blade at this time.



How Did Four South-West States End Up With So Many Amazing Sights?




IT WAS EASY!

Just flood the whole area with an inland sea for a few gazillion years. Add lots of creatures to leave layer after layer of their remains on the sea bottom. Let it ebb and flow, dry and flood. Add some volcanic action and plate tectonics uplifting. Some wind and rain and ice. More flooding, more drying and VOILE!...you get the:

COLORADO PLATEAU

(Although most of it is in Utah and Arizona, go figure.)



The Red Dot is 4-Corners.

Utah, Colorado above; Arizona and New Mexico below.

Here's how Wiki-pedia describes it... "Uplift from the Laramide paused briefly in the Eocene. Meandering streams flowed slowly over the resulting broad and almost featureless plains. Periodic but extensive floods inundated large areas perhaps once every 1,000 years; spreading mud, cobbles and fine silt over the plains. Erosion incised these deposits between flood events and plant growth was abundant. Oxidation of the iron in the mud and silt turned the soil into hematite, giving it a pink and red hue. These sediments were later lithified into the up-to-700 feet-thick Pink Member of the locally Eocene-aged Claron Formation (previously called the Wasatch Formation). Channelized conglomerates of this member can be easily seen in Red Canyon - its silt and mudstones compose most of the park's fragile and colorful spires called hoodoos. Geologist Clarence Dutton called the iron oxide-rich lower member of the Claron the Pink Cliffs series due to its colorful appearance."

Clear as mud, eh?!



And these are the glorious Bryce Canyon HOO DOOs we all know and love.

So, what's a Hoo Doo? It's those amazingly weird formations that delight young and old.














Below is a 4-step diagram I found of how HOO DOOs form from the soft sandstone layers. A few million years of water, wind, rain, lather, rinse, repeat...slowly wears them down.












The top layer of sediment is tougher than the bottom layers and acts like a protective shield to keep the whole thing from dissolving away. Pretty amazing.

I also discovered that Hoo Doos form all around the world, not just in our southwest! (more on that, later.)



The Feb. issue spot-lighted some of the amazing sites in northern Arizona that don't get as much attention as THE BIG FIVE UTAH PARKS but before we continue our exploration into more "lesser-known sites" I thought we ought to take a peek at some of the spectacular formations in the BIG FIVE - The map below actually dips down into Arizona so use the diagram from the Feb. Issue to orient yourself.





I've spent so much time looking at these pictures and maps and watching U-tube videos about other people's trips I feel like I've already been to all these places. Say, once you see something and then return home, all you really have of the trip is your 'memories'. I think I'll just keep stuffing my brain full of photos and then 'think' I actually went somewhere. Ha! I won't have to leave home at all...that should save a few bucks & lots of wear and tear.


