





# A Safety Tip

Rock Polishing And Why
We Should ALWAYS Be
Wearing A Mask.

I was taught to consider anything ending in -ite to be highly dangerous...

malachite, phenacite, apatite, hydroxyapatite, fluorite, pyrite, amazonite, hematite, iolite, lepidolite, labradorite, azurite, prehnite, and the most dangerous crocidolite (blue asbestos) are just some of the dangerous -ites.

But, there are many other highly toxic materials not ending in -ite like... chrysotile (white asbestos), quartz, galena, cinnabar, lapis lazuli, moonstone, tiger's eye, serpentine...and even if you are not polishing a toxic stone your Genie Buddy in the shop with you might be!

It's pretty safe to say that the materials that make stones so beautiful can be dangerous and deadly when improperly handled. Please use proper equipment and ventilation when cutting and polishing all stones.

### Tail-Gate/Gem Sale: Lynn Becker






# Welcome to the COLORADO PLATEAU. (See Map on Page 5)

When I started this research about the <u>Sandstone Layers Of The Colorado Plateau</u>, I had the very naïve notion that once I learned the COLOR of each sandstone sediment FORMATION layer, I would be able to look at a photo of the Utah/Arizona sandstone and instantly know its Formation Name. Boy! Was I wrong!








Navajo sandstone in detail. Colorado Plateau. Utah/Arizona.

1. The "White Navajo Sandstone" isn't only WHITE...it can also be RED...

...And black, brown, crimson, vermillion, purple, orange, salmon, pink, gold, yellow and ...?

2. The "Red Entrada Sandstone" isn't only RED...it can also be WHITE...

...And brown, tan, light yellow-orange, gray and...?

Well, so much for using the COLOR of sandstone as a way to know the "name of the sandstone".

OK, back to my research...

We all learned that Sedimentary Rock forms in horizontal layers under the earth's oceans. Right?

...so, since the Colorado Plateau was once under an inland sea, the layers must be the same through-out the entire 'level' plateau. Right?!

Perfect! I'll just learn the sandstone layer names because each type of formation will be made out of the same layers. Right?!

(The bright green splotch is the Colorado Plateau...)→→



I can check my "search history" for the exact count, but I think I have now read over 1,500 different geological reports, studies, findings, histories, chemical analysis, plate tectonics, geologic time lines, rebuttals, observations, Travel Blogs, and Field Trip Reports about the Colorado Plateau and discovered that the Plateau has about 22 different sediment layers.


Next, I discovered that due to plate tectonics, the Colorado Plateau was quite a world traveler! It appears that it took a brief few million years vacation "as a beach" on the EQUATOR while it was forming its 22 sediment layers!

The **COLORADO PLATEAU** (the bright green splotch on the globe...) was formed near **sea level** <u>south</u> of the EQUATOR!

Yep. That's where LAURASIA was located while the **COLORADO PLATEAU** was forming...in a belt of strong trade winds.

These winds moved the sand and built dunes that covered an area bigger than the Sahara Desert!


NOTE: A large accumulation of desert sand is called an ERG (aka sand sea).



So far, so good...parallel mineral sand sediments, near sea level, creating many horizontal layers...it should be easy to recognize the 22 different layers! Easy peasy.

# Wrong! On so-o-o many "layers"!

NOT ALL 22 Sandstone FORMATIONS are found in ALL PARTS of the COLORADO PLATEAU



(Hey! Don't laugh! Back when I was in school they were still scoffing at the silly notion of Tectonic Plates, Subduction zones, and Continental Drift!)

Remember those 1,500+ different geological reports I mentioned?
Well, here's what I discovered about the Sediment Formations of the Colorado Plateau:

- 1. THE NAMES OF ABOUT 22 SANDSTONE STRATA LAYERS and all of their sub-groups.
- 2. WHEN THEY FORMED: ... Proterozoic...Permian...Triassic, Jurassic, Cretaceous...
- 3. WHERE THEY ENDED UP: State & Federal Parks, Canyons, and as cool features (i.e. the WAVE)
- 4. HOW THEY GOT THEIR COLORS: from iron, plant-life, living organisms, etc.
- 5. "WHAT" THEY FORMED: ...Cliffs, Plateaus, Hoodoos, Arches, Monoliths, etc
- 6. DEPTHS OF THE SANDSTONE FORMATIONS: ...from inches to thousands of feet!
- 7. COMPOSITION OF EACH FORMATION: ...sand, clay, silt, slate, limestone, fossils, etc.
- 8. CLIMATE CONDITIONS DURING EACH FORMATION: ...arid, wet, windy, flooding, etc.
- 9. PLATE TECTONICS: ...uplifts, folds, slumps, volcanic influences, etc.
- 10. THERE IS NO SIMPLE WAY TO LEARN WHICH LAYER IS WHICH.






Navajo owned Canyon de Chelly ("de shay")

While I ponder what area of the Great Southwest Adventure to explore for the May issue, here's some fun DIDJUNOs that I discovered during my WEB journey...

**DIDJUNO**...that you can suffer from ALTITUDE SICKNESS while visiting the parks on the COLORADO PLATEAU?

ZION is at 3,000 feet in elevation. BRYCE CANYON is at 8,000-9,000 ft. CEDAR BREAKS is at 10,000 ft.

Beware: higher elevations can trigger altitude sickness: headache, nausea, lack of energy and appetite – but could also be deadly- pulmonary edema, or water on the lungs. Victims can die if they aren't transported right away to a lower altitude, says Tod Schimelpfenig, the curriculum director of Wilderness Medicine Institute in Lander, Wyo.



DIDJUNO... The largest ERG (sand sea) to ever exist in North America is in the Jurassic-age NAVAJO SANDSTONE (approx. 180-190 million years old) and that it is up to 2,500 feet thick!




You'd be a dot at the bottom (here ↑) of this NAVAJO Sandstone in Snow Canyon State Park!

DIDJUNO...Erosion and weathering over time have removed many FEET and in some cases MILES—of rock from the surface of the Southwest?!

DIDJUNO...that rocks can be changed from RED to WHITE? (And without Clorox!)

#### Non-technical version:

See the rusty iron spots? → Those are called Moqui Marbles. Navajo Sandstone is very porous so as fluid seeped through the pores, and probably with the help of microbes, it sucked out all the RED IRON. The iron then gathered into balls called "concretions", leaving the sandstone "bleached white".





As the sandstone weathers, the "balls" are released and roll down the cliff-sides to be scattered on the ground in huge numbers.

(But, it's illegal to take even one from a Park.)

DIDJUNO...nobody thought about Moquis until their "cousins" were discovered on MARS. No joke. They called them Martian Blueberries (due to the false colors of the space photos). Then the scientists saw the Moki marbles and put 2 and 2 together...Eureka! They said, "These formed from water...we think there might be water on Mars, too!"

Large amounts of underground ice have been found on Mars; the volume of water detected is equivalent to the volume of water in Lake Superior. In September 2020, scientists confirmed the existence of several large saltwater lakes under ice in the south polar region of the planet Mars!
